Beware, keep alert; for you do not know when the time will come. Mark 13:33

I use my alarm clock (on my phone) just one day a week. That day is Sunday- it would not be an easy story to tell if the pastor slept in on a Sunday and everyone else was waiting at church. Many people need to set an alarm to get up for school or work. Setting an alarm means that you have made a plan, you have calculated how much time you will need to rise, wash, dress, eat, and get out the door. It puts you in control of your morning routine. If it is really important to be up and ready (to catch that early flight at the airport for example) I am not above setting an alarm and also a back-up alarm. When I know what time something will happen, I am really good about being ready.

Unexpected things are a different story. Sometimes things happen that I do not expect and I get caught unprepared. Last year in November, Kristi and I visited my parents in Arizona in early November. We flew out of Bismarck and enjoyed some days in the sun as we pitched in to help them open up the winter home for the season. We did not know that we would return and find over a foot of snow had fallen on the car in long term parking, or that the plow would have raised a huge mound of snow along the row of vehicles next to us. We certainly didn't travel with our winter coats. It was still warm when we left. Fortunately, we had a small shovel in the trunk, but not our regular winter emergency bags. Jesus is speaking to us in Mark's gospel this day as he reminds us that we do not know when the messiah will come again. We can't set an alarm for it or pack the bags and have them in the proper places. All we can do is keep watch. We know that Jesus will return, but we don't know when. Like the watchman at the gate, our task at this time is to keep awake- keep watch- because sleeping on the job will not cut it.

Ten bridesmaids took their lamps and went to meet the bridegroom. Five of them were foolish, and five were wise. When the foolish took their lamps, they took no oil with them; but the wise took flasks of oil with their lamps. Matthew 25:1b-4

The five foolish bridesmaids were not prepared for unexpected circumstances. They did not consider their meeting with the bridegroom could be delayed. This is similar to scenarios in daily life. It is easy to prepare for running out of milk because we can see the milk jug in the refrigerator is near empty so we buy more before it too late. Similarly with the gas gauge in our cars, we are warned or alerted of the near empty tank so we fill up before that happens. But in this parable, we are told to expect the unexpected, to be prepared always. Such as always having an umbrella in the car because you never know when an unforecasted rain shower can pop up. I enjoy hiking and have done so in the Grand Canyon, southeastern Minnesota, Oahu, and the Phoenix area. More often than not the hikes take longer than I anticipate and therefore it's important for me to bring additional water bottles and nourishment. I need to be prepared for unexpected circumstances and ensure I have plenty of hydration.

I believe the main point of this parable is, our readiness for Jesus' return is determined by our stewardship of the resources He has given us. We who follow Him must live in a state of readiness for His return.

He has warned us that He will arrive with no notice, interrupting the daily activities of all of us who expect life to simply go on as it always has. Jesus urges His followers to be prepared and watch for His return.

Elijah said to her, "Do not be afraid; go and do as you have said; but first make me a little cake of it and bring it to me, and afterwards make something for yourself and your son. For thus says the LORD the God of Israel: The jar of meal will not be emptied and the jug of oil will not fail until the day that the LORD sends rain on the earth." 1 Kings 17:13-14

I like milk on my cereal for breakfast. In the years when our then teenaged sons lived at home, I developed a well-grounded fear of running out of milk. I could look into the refrigerator before going to bed at 10 o'clock and see a half gallon of milk ready for me to have more than plenty in the morning. By 7:30 am after our sons had left for school, I would pour myself a bowl of cereal, open the refrigerator, and discover NO milk. Not a drop. Shortly after that happened a second time, I instituted the "black Sharpie rule." I drew a thick black line four inches above the bottom of the milk bottle. The line encircled the whole bottle so it could be seen from any direction. You may not drink milk below the line made by the black Sharpie marker on the side of the milk bottle unless you can see another unopened container of milk already in the refrigerator.

Elijah speaks to the widow of Zarephath during a time of severe drought. She is about to use the last of her flour (meal) and oil to make the last food for her son and herself before they have no more to eat. Elijah's request for food is extreme. She barely has enough for her son and herself. There is no extra to share. But God has a promise. Their flour and oil will not run out until after the rains end the drought.

Advent brings a message, Do Not Be Afraid! God will provide all you need. Let go of your fear of cereal without milk. Let go of your fear that there will not be enough potatoes or Christmas cookies or whatever special ingredient you cannot find this year. Your fear will not stop God's promise from coming to you. Christ is coming. Christ is coming soon. When Christ comes, you will have all you need.
